The October 2019 Nautilus International General Meeting is your chance to join with fellow members and shape the future

eld every four years, the Nautilus General Meeting (GM) is where the core policies of the Union are determined by full members following debate and discussion on motions to the meeting.

This GM looks set to be bigger than ever — with an extra day added to the conference specifically to discuss the challenges and opportunities facing the industry and the Union over the next 10 years.

The 2019 GM will be held at the Hilton Hotel in Rotterdam, with members assembling on Monday 7 October for the conference to begin on Tuesday morning. It concludes with a gala dinner on Thursday 9 October, and guests can depart the hotel at leisure on the morning of Friday 9 October.

The theme for GM19 is 'Global Industry, Global Workforce, Global Union' to reflect the global nature of the maritime industry, the work members do, and the Union that unites them. We want as many members as possible to take part.

There are a number of ways to take part in the meeting. With the backing of four full members, you can submit a motion to the meeting using the form on pages 34-35. Please note that the form appears in the three languages of the Union but the meeting will be conducted in English only.

All members are encouraged to attend the meeting in person, taking part in debates and voting on motions. This needn't put you out of pocket, as Nautilus can provide financial assistance with travel and accommodation costs for up to 200 members, to ensure that the meeting is attended by a representative cross-section of full members.

The meeting will feature multimedia reports on the Union's achievements from the last four years, and debates on motions setting the agenda for the next four. There is also a great line-up of speakers.

Guy Platten, the secretary general of the International Chamber of Shipping, will be the keynote speaker on the first day of the conference and Han Busker, the president of the Netherlands trade union confederation FNV will address the meeting on Wednesday.

On Thursday, as part of a day focusing on the longer-term vision for the Union and the industry, ITF general secretary Steve Cotton will speak, followed by Dr Cleopatra Doumbia-Henry, president of World Maritime University and 'Mother of the Maritime Labour Convention'.

The conference will feature meetings of the Nautilus Young Maritime Professionals Forum and Nautilus Women's Forum. The winner of the Nautilus Photo competition (see page 48) will also be announced.

We plan to broadcast live from the meeting so you will be able to follow events online via YouTube or Facebook. You can even send in questions via Facebook or Twitter. 

he deadline is fast approaching for nominations to four Nautilus

awards, so members are urged to think quickly if they know someone who should be honoured for their bravery or professionalism. The award categories are:

Nevins and Griffiths Award,

given for acts of bravery, community work, Nautilus activity, involvement in the wider trade union movement, and academic or research achievement.

The most recent recipients of this award were Gordon Thompson (2015), a former trustee director; and Brian Orrell (2011), former general secretary.

Nautilus Award, given by the Council for exceptional professional work by members.

The most recent recipients of this award were the officers and crew of RFA Argus (2015) to recognise their support for humanitarian relief in Sierra Leone and the fight against Ebola.

In 2011 the honour was given to Nautilus members who were carrying out their work under

the constant threat of pirate attacks.

Victoria Drummond Award

presented to members whose achievements boost the profile of women at sea

The most recent recipients of this award are: Captain Barbara Campbell, for her distinguished maritime career and her volunteer and charitable work in sail training; and Captain Emma Tiller, for her ambassadorial role in encouraging women at sea.

General Secretary's Award,

which is a new award agreed by the Council to recognise the achievement of Nautilus activists such as a lay representative/cadre leden/vertrauensleute who has shown exemplary commitment to the Union's goals and to supporting fellow members.
